### Survey Fielded 11/5-12/7/11

- 56% response rate from the 299 MPCers
- Responses "All" compared to sub-groups
  - Friends of Family (FOF)
  - o U-54
  - Fewer than 10 year MPCers
  - Responses from 1994 & 2006 Mission Studies

### MPCer Demographics . . .


- Gender: 69% female (62% in 2006)
- Age:
  - 76% over 55 years
  - 28% over 75 years (19% in 2006)
- Race: 95% white (98% in 1994)
- Sexual Orientation: 89% heterosexual
- HH Income: \$88K MPC vs. \$45K Oakland

#### Education

95% college graduates

70% post graduate work or degrees (69%

in 1994)



### Religious Upbringing

- o 95% grew up in a church
  - 46% Presbyterians
  - 13% Catholics
  - 9% Baptist
- 13 denominations in all

# Church and Community Participation

- 80% 10+ years
- 80% members
- 29% only come for service—no other involvement
- 44% claim to have 4+ close friends at church
- 22% say no close friends at church

## 2011 FOF Compared to All

ObservationFOF	<u>FOF</u>	<u>ALL</u>	PT Diff
Even though they are so similar otherwise, FOF differ from members in that they don't share a strong sense of belonging to MPC	16%	44%	-28
Tasks of Church: Help members understand Christian Stewardship needs more attention	36%	12%	24

### 2011: U-54 Compared to All

<u>Observation</u>	<u>U-54</u>	<u>ALL</u>	<u>Diff</u>
U-54 originally more attracted to child or youth programs	52%	29%	23
U-54 cite child and youth programs as #1 reason for staying at MPC	70%	20%	50
