Parables of Jesus in Context

Eugene Park

Many of the parables of Jesus in the synoptic gospels reflect the harsh reality of the day-to-day life of ordinary peasants in the time of Jesus. We will take a look at the social stratification of the ancient agrarian society during the Iron Age in the Mediterranean world to understand the socio-political dynamics embedded in the narrative world of the parables of Jesus. Then we will reflect on the effects the parables must have produced in the ears of the original audience. We will also ponder upon the theological meaning of the parables of Jesus for the 21st century Christians, who are far removed from the original setting but who still consider themselves as part of the target audience of the bible.



Dr. Park teaches at the San Francisco Theological Seminary and has taught at MPC before.




