Stolen Pride: Loss, Shame and the Rise of the Right Book discussion

In partnership with Great Good Place for Books, MPC will be hosting National Book Award finalist and bestselling author, Arlie Hochschild. Ms. Hochschild will be discussing her latest book, *Stolen Pride: Loss, Shame and the Rise of the Right* which explores life in a struggling Appalachian town. What happens, Ms. Hochschild asks, when a proud people in a hard-hit region suffer the deep loss of pride and are confronted with a powerful political appeal that makes it feel "stolen"?

Arlie Russell Hochschild is an American professor emeritus of sociology at the University of California, Berkeley and writer. Hochschild has long focused on the human emotions that underlie moral beliefs, practices, and social life generally. She is the author of 10 books including *Strangers in Their Own Land: Anger and Mourning of the American Right*.


Session 3 – March 30 - Great Western Road Trip, Spanning Six States and two Canadian Provinces – Cynthia Cudaback

# Culture, History and Re-emergence of California Native Peoples

The indigenous tribes of California have been here for nearly 14,000 years. Their cultures have been grounded in certain essential principles: Seeing life as a wondrous gift and practicing a stance of gratitude in all things; living in an intimate relationship with the natural world; and choosing to be in reciprocal relationship with Nature and with all beings.





## Session 1 - March 9 - The Culture of California's Native Peoples

In this class, we will be exploring some of this early culture and spiritual life. Speaker Father Michael Galvan, descendant of the Ohlone/Miwok trip and retired Catholic Priest will also preach a sermon prior to the class. A resource for this class (not required) would be a recent short book, *The Serviceberry*, by Robin Wall Kimmerer.

# Session 2 – April 6 - Recent History of California's Native Peoples

Beginning in 1770 California's native tribes were confronted with a series of traumatic experiences: the Spanish mission period, the Mexican Rancho period, and the period of settler domination. These were times of terrible subjugation and even genocide.

In this class, we will detail some of these events and recognize the churches' involvement in many of them. Our speaker will be Robert McNally, the author of The Modoc War. A resource for this class (not required) would be a book, An Indigenous People's History of the United States, by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz.

# Session 3 - May 4- Re-emergence of California's Native Peoples

Since the late 1960s native peoples have been rising up and re-asserting their cultural identity and spiritual practices. All over the country and here in California we see signs of this historic re-emergence. Native peoples are reminding us that they have been here for thousands of years and will continue to be here.

In this class, we will detail some of these developments and ask the question, "What relationship do we need to take to all of this?" A resource for this class (not required) would be a short novel, *There There*, by Tommy Orange.
